

Food Processor Licensing Guide

The Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) is devoted to the total support of agriculture in Kansas. While we must fulfill our statutory obligations, the department is dedicated to providing support and assistance to make Kansas farms, ranches and agribusinesses successful and help them grow if that is their desire. We also encourage more farms, ranches and other agriculture businesses to expand in or relocate to Kansas. This checklist will help guide you through various resources and requirements for opening and operating a typical Kansas food processor. In addition to license requirements by KDA, other Kansas agencies, as well as local or federal government agencies, may have regulatory requirements to follow. Contact your local planning authority to ensure you follow all local business development laws, rules, regulations and guidelines. This guide is designed to assist you as you work to build and operate a successful food processor in Kansas.

	Department of Agriculture — Weights and Measures <u>www.agriculture.ks.gov</u>	No license is needed from Weights and Measures. Any business with a weighing or meas- uring device (e.g. scales, fertilizer meters, oil meters, measuring tapes, electric car chargers, taxi meters, etc.) must hire a <u>licensed service company</u> to inspect and test devic- es once annually, and any time additional maintenance, repairs, adjustments and calibra- tions are made throughout the year if the devices are used to determine the cost of any transaction. 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	Department of Health and Environment — Bureau of Waste Management <u>www.kdheks.gov</u>	Facilities producing specialized organic waste may compost or apply this material to the land. Composting facilities less than one-half acre must <u>register</u> with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) and facilities greater than one-half acre must obtain a <u>permit</u> . An <u>application for approval</u> must be obtained to apply organic waste to land. For more information, review the <u>KDHE Solid Waste</u> webpage or call (785) 296-2751. 	United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS), Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act (PACA) Division	Any person who buys or sells more than 2,000 pounds of fresh or frozen fruits and vegeta- bles in any given day is required to be licensed under the Perishable Agricultural Com- modities Act (PACA). Wholesalers, processors, grocery wholesalers and foodservice firms fit into this category. Additionally, any entity selling at retail is subject to a PACA license once the invoice costs of fresh and frozen fruits and vegetable purchases exceed \$230,000 in a calendar year.
